Vision Attainment Strategies

Environmental Stewardship

- A. Maintain Open Space:
 - Annex state trust land and develop according to town zoning and codes (low density and open space)
 - Follow recommendations of Planning and Zoning Board and rigidly adhere to and enforce zoning rules and codes already in place; limit variances and changes
 - Ensure codes mirror the vision of environmental stewardship (include dark skies: limit lighting)
- B. Environmental Maintenance
 - Ensure this has high budget priority
 - Ensure maintenance is planned and carried out on a regular basis (keep washes clear, control erosion, re-vegetate, etc.)
- C. Replant and refurbish parks in a style compatible with natural environment
- D. Ensure public access to open areas through planning
- E. Ensure that commercial and residential new construction is styled in line with the environmental vision
- F. Ensure existing commercial buildings are well maintained and refurbished as needed
- G. Control/limit signage
- H. Encourage conservation and use of green materials/energy efficiency.

Community of diverse ages and socioeconomic levels

- A. Improve quality of schools
 - Ensure teacher pay is attractive
 - Meet with school board to discuss and identify action steps
- B. Attract a Community
 - Provide additional cultural and recreational opportunities, senior center, theater, pool recreation center, skate park, library expansion

Small town, sophisticated, strong sense of community

- A. Investigate community based service: fire, police
- B. Provide community events: concerts and art fair
- C. Encourage involvement in community groups that bring people together; help groups increase visibility (partner with the town)
- D. Encourage use of technology to keep commuters in the loop
